Creation Care news: Avoid 'Wishcycling'

We find ourselves asking what and where to recycle—searching high and low for the appropriate recycle bin or rinsing and cleaning various containers only to realize they don't quite match the required recycling specifications.

After all that effort, it's easy to throw the container in the most appropriate bin...wishing that it is similar enough and will be recycled anyway.

"Wishcycling" has its consequences, however. When inappropriate items are placed in bins, even one or two misplaced recyclables can destroy the entire load. This means that large bins full of recycled materials are thrown out and directly added to the landfill.









